

# Community Safety Partnership Performance Guide


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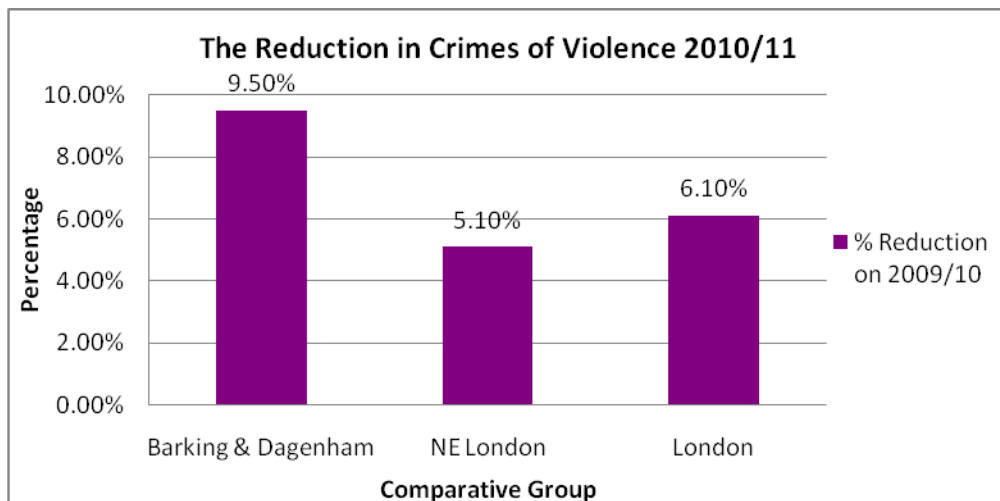
This guidance document is intended to inform Partnership members of performance measure definitions, typical good performance “Good to be high” / “Good to be low” and baseline figures for comparison.

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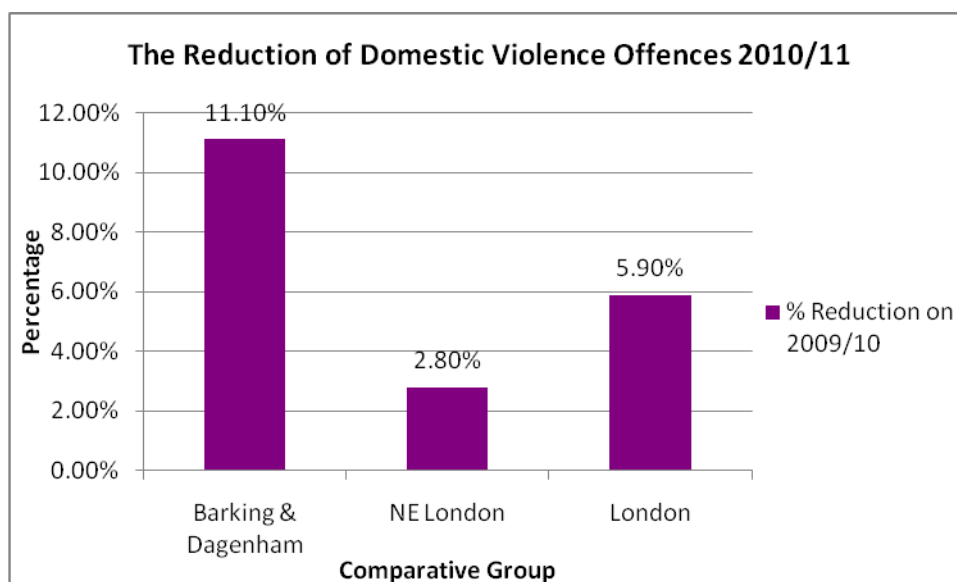
# 1. The number of crimes of violence

<b>Definition</b>	<p>A crime in which the offender uses or threatens to use violent force upon the victim, this includes Murder, Violence with Injury, Common Assault, Harassment, Threats/ Conspiracy to Kill, Blackmail and Kidnapping</p>	
<b>Good performance</b>	<p>Good performance would be to have the lowest number of crimes of violence possible and to have this number fall on a year by year basis.</p> <p>These figures will be compared with the NE London area and the London area.</p>	
<b>Base Line</b>	<p>In 2010/11 there were <b>1975</b> crimes of violence committed in the borough.</p> <p>This was a <b>9.5% reduction</b> on the 2009/10 year compared to a <b>5.1% Reduction</b> for the North East London Comparison and a <b>6.1% reduction</b> for London as a whole.</p> <p>The target for London is to reduce the number of crimes of violence by 2%</p>	




## 2. The number of domestic violence offences

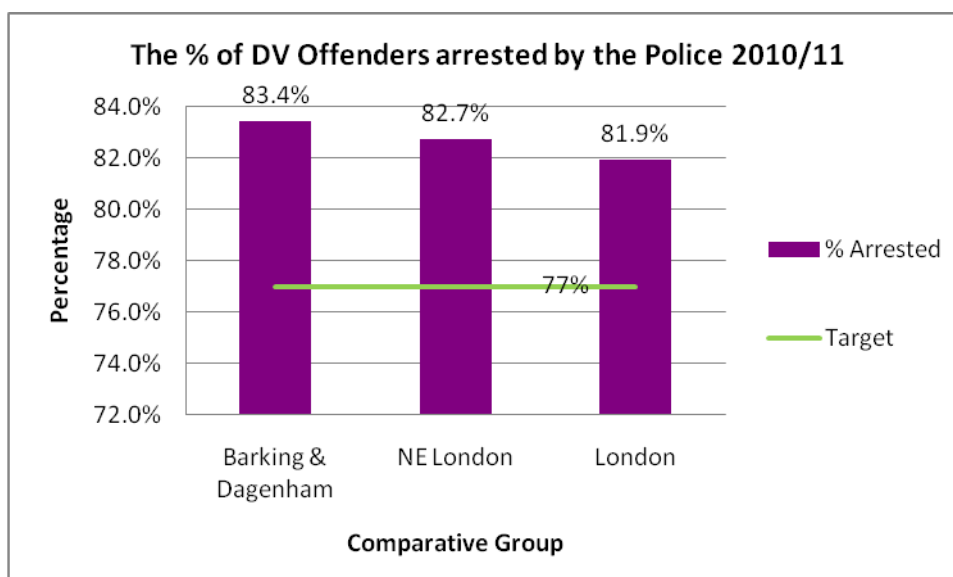
<b>Definition</b>	<p>Any incident of threatening behaviour, violence, or abuse (psychological, physical, sexual, financial or emotional) between adults who are or have been intimate partners or family members, regardless of gender</p>	
<b>Good performance</b>	<p>Good performance is considered as having a lower number of offences with high percentage reductions in comparison with the previous year.</p> <p>These figures will be compared with the NE London area and the London area.</p>	
<b>Base Line</b>	<p>In the year 2010/11 there was <b>1770</b> incidents of domestic violence in the borough.</p> <p>This was an <b>11.1% reduction</b> from the previous year compared to a <b>2.8% reduction</b> for the North East London comparative and a <b>5.9% reduction</b> for London as a whole.</p>	






## 4. The % of DV offenders arrested by the police

<b>Definition</b>	<p>The number of domestic violence offenders arrested by the police for the offence</p>	
<b>Good performance</b>	<p>Good performance would be to increase the arrest rate to meet our target of 78.6%</p> <p>These figures will be compared with the NE London area and the London area.</p>	
<b>Base Line</b>	<p>In the year 2010/11 the domestic violence offender arrest rate in the borough was <b>83.4%</b>, this is compared to the <b>82.7%</b> arrest rate for the North East London comparative and <b>81.9%</b> for the whole of London.</p> <p>The target we have set for DV offenders arrested is <b>78.6%</b></p>	




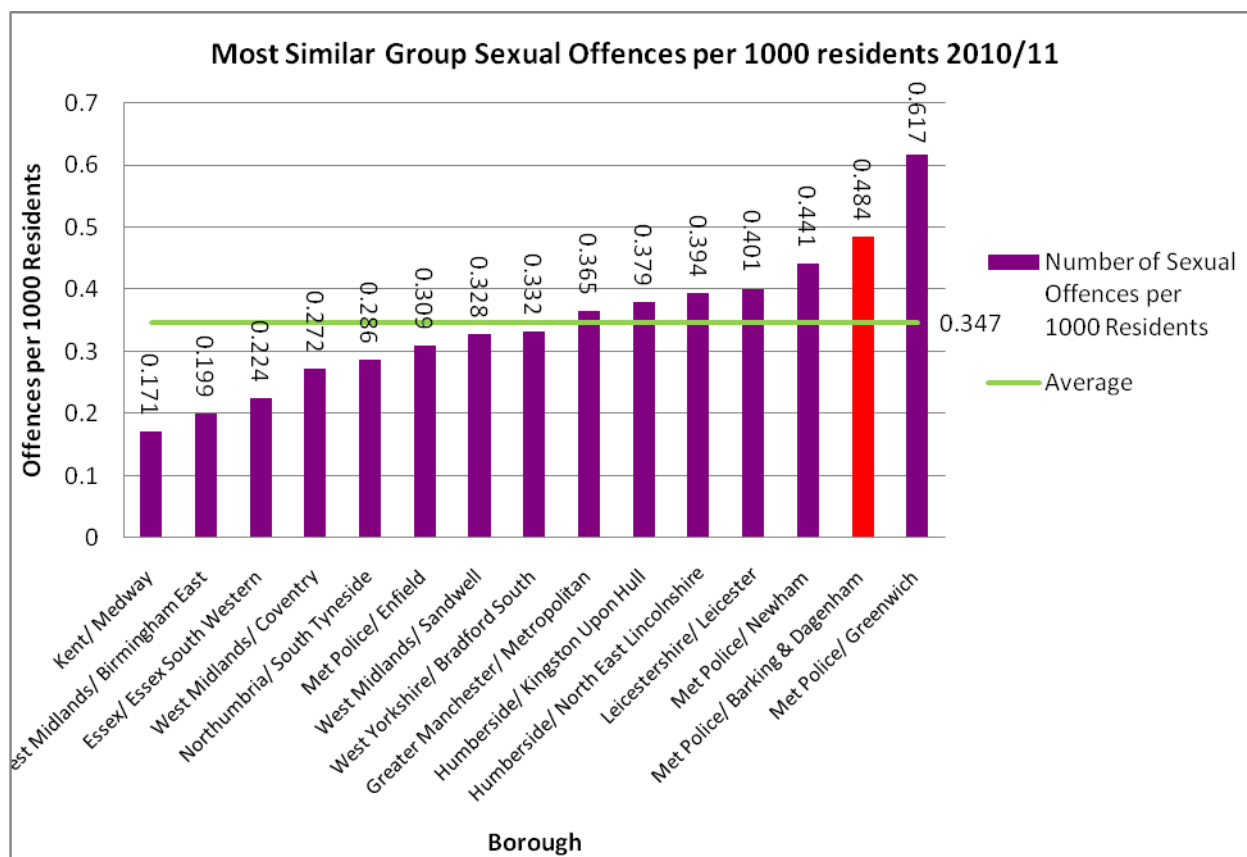
## 5. The number of men who re offend after a minimum of 12 weeks attendance at a DV perpetrator programme

<b>Definition</b>	Men who are reported to Police by their partners for perpetrating domestic violence incidents after completing a minimum of 12 weeks of the commissioned D V perpetrator programme	
<b>Good performance</b>	0 men reported to Police for perpetrating domestic violence incidents after completing a minimum of 12 weeks of the commissioned DV perpetrator programme	
<b>Base Line</b>	The Base Line Data is being set in 2011/12

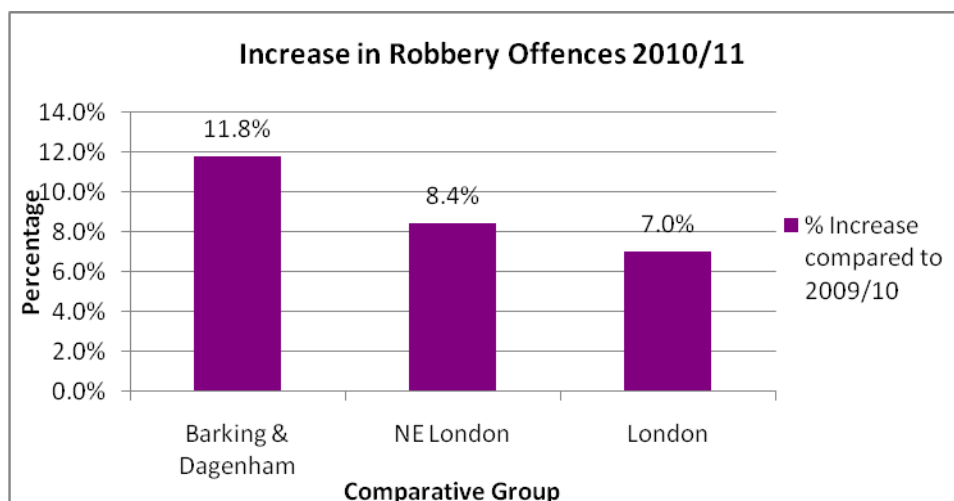
## 6. The number of sexual offences

<b>Definition</b>	All offences of rape, sexual activity involving a child under 13, sexual assault, causing sexual activity without consent, sexual activity etc with a person with a mental disorder, abuse of children through prostitution and pornography, trafficking for sexual exploitation.	
<b>Good performance</b>	Good performance will be considered achieving a lower number of offences than in 2010/11 it would also be reducing our ranking from 3 <sup>rd</sup> highest offences in the group of most similar areas.  These figures will be compared with the NE London area and the London area.	
<b>Base Line</b>	In 2010/11 there were a total of <b>263</b> Sexual offences in Barking and Dagenham, this figure was a slight decrease on the <b>265</b> offences committed in 2009/10.	




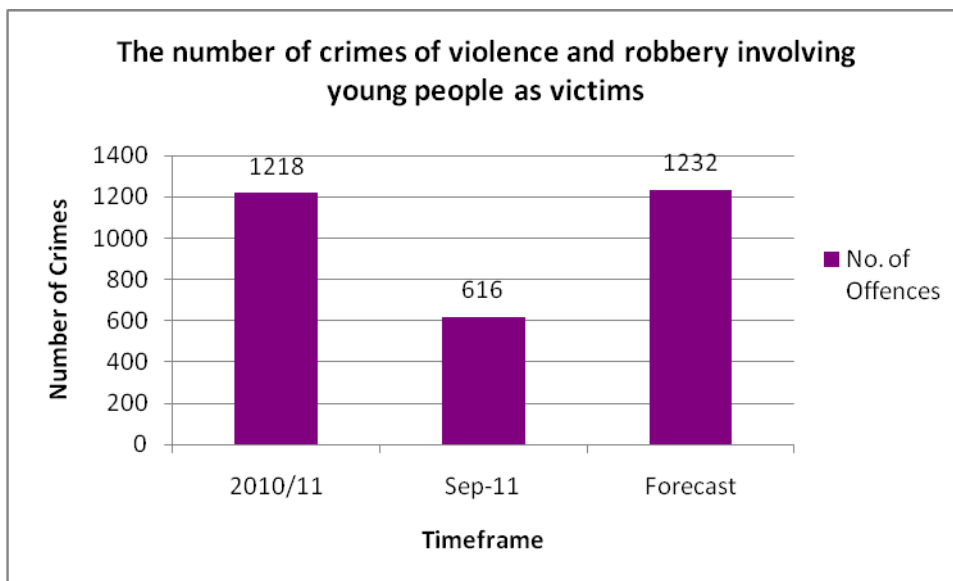
## 7. The number of robbery offences

<p><b>Definition</b></p>	<p>Robbery is a form of aggravated theft, in that it involves the offence of theft through the offender's use of physical force or fear against a victim. The crime of robbery almost always requires the presence of a victim who suffers actual injury, or is threatened with harm.</p>	
<p><b>Good performance</b></p>	<p>Good performance is considered as having a lower number of offences with high percentage reductions in comparison with the previous year.</p> <p>These figures will be compared with the North East London area and the London area.</p>	
<p><b>Base Line</b></p>	<p>In the year 2010/11 there was <b>929</b> robbery offences committed in the borough.</p> <p>This was an <b>11.8% rise</b> on the previous year compared to an <b>8.4%</b> rise for the North East London comparative and a <b>7%</b> rise for London as a whole.</p>	




## 8. The number of crimes of violence and robbery involving young people as victims

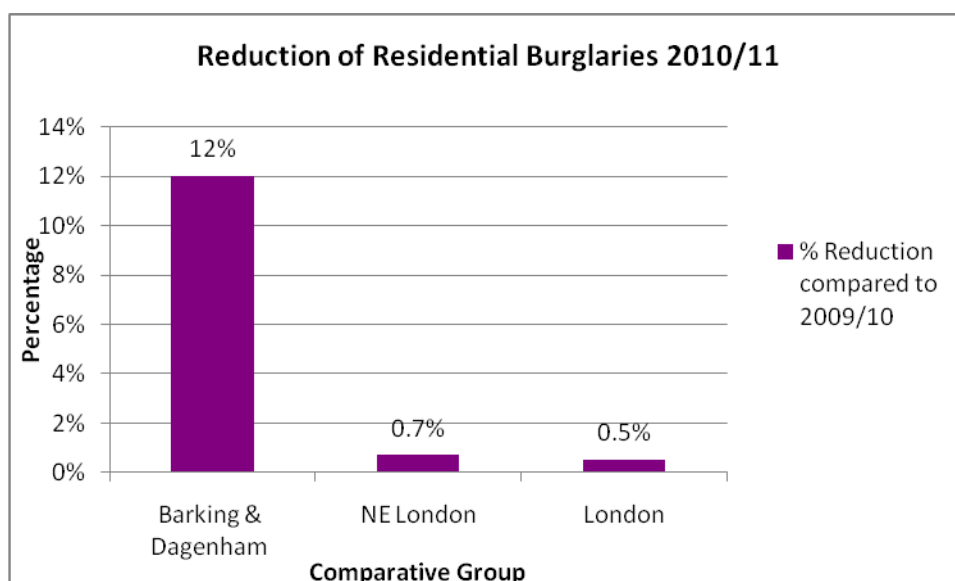
<b>Definition</b>	The Number of incidents of violence/serious violence (as defined in 1. above) and robbery where the victim is a young person (aged 1-19)	
<b>Good performance</b>	Good performance would be to have less than the Number incidents of violence and robbery involving young people as victims which occurred in 2010-11	
<b>Base Line</b>	In the year 2010/11 there were 1218 incidents of violence and robbery involving a young people as the victim in the borough.

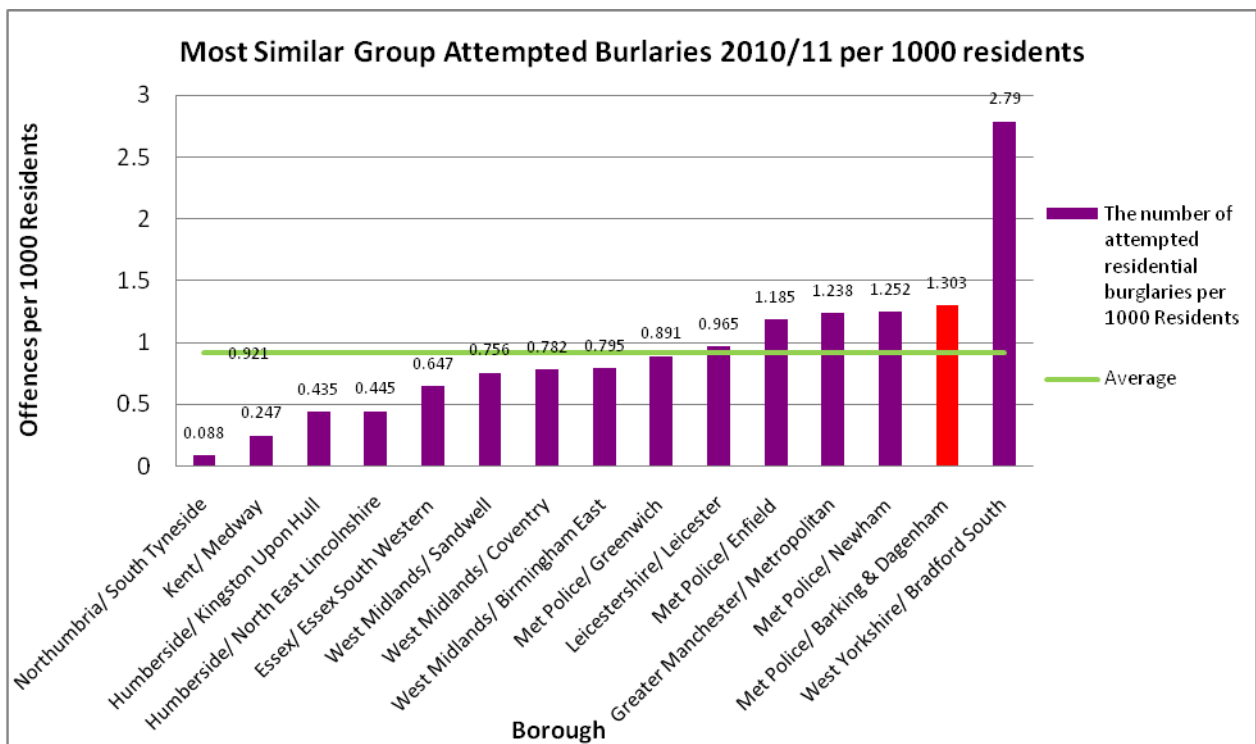
## 9. The number of residential burglaries

<p><b>Definition</b></p>	<p>Offences of entering any residential building as a trespasser with the intent to steal or cause unlawful damage or having entered the building, steals or attempts to steal anything or inflicts or attempts to inflict on any person therein any grievous bodily harm. Including attempted burglaries. Excludes burglary of commercial property, sheds, outbuildings etc.</p>	
<p><b>Good performance</b></p>	<p>Good performance would be achieving a lower number of residential burglaries and a higher number of attempted burglaries which indicates that the homes in the borough are becoming more secure.</p> <p>These figures will be compared with the Most Similar Group of Boroughs.</p>	
<p><b>Base Line</b></p>	<p>In the year 2010/11 there was <b>1552</b> residential burglaries committed in the borough.</p> <p>This was a <b>12% reduction</b> on the year before, compared to a <b>0.7% reduction</b> for the North East London comparative and a <b>0.5% reduction</b> for London as a whole.</p> <p>The target for this year is to reduce the number of Residential Burglaries by 9%</p>	




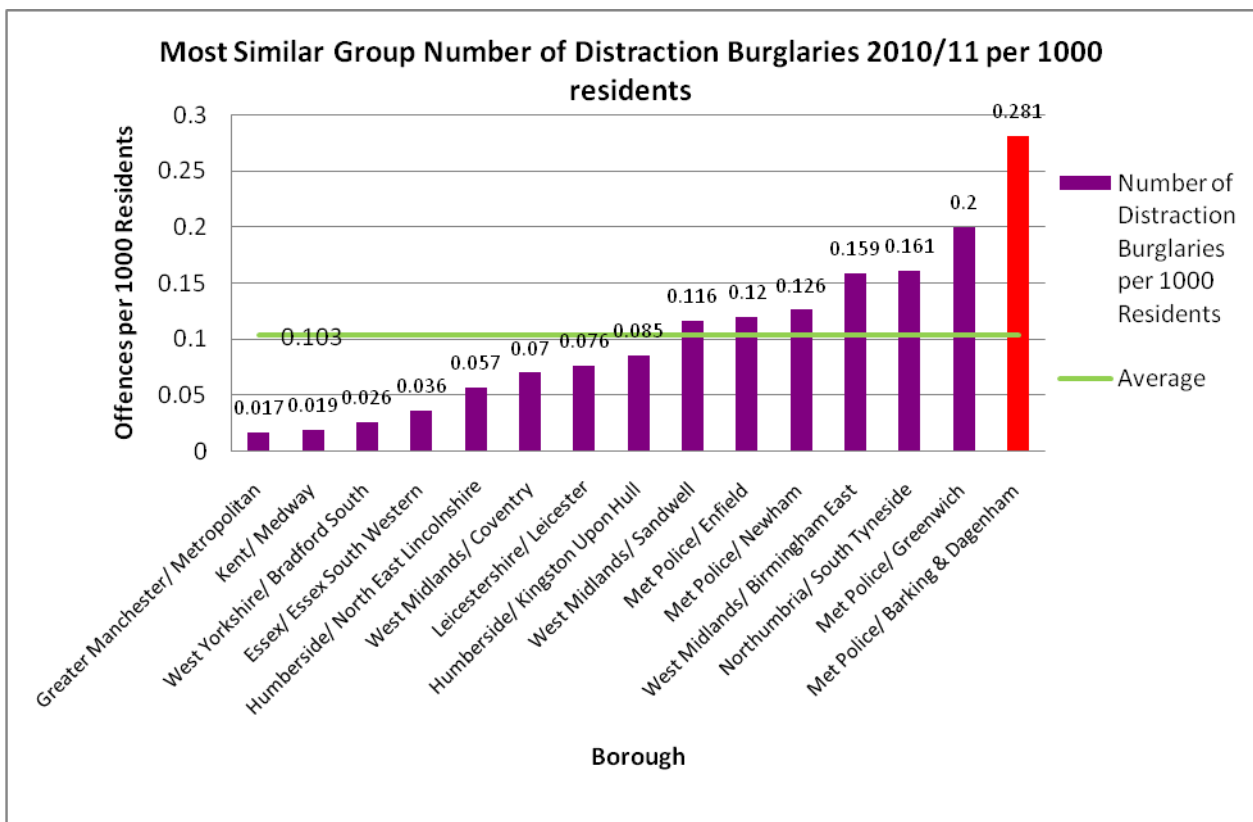
# 10. The number of attempted residential burglaries

<b>Definition</b>	The number of incidents where a residential burglary was attempted but was not completed	
<b>Good performance</b>	Good performance is considered as having a lower number of offences with high percentage reductions in comparison with the previous year.  These figures will be compared with the North East London area and the London area.	
<b>Base Line</b>	In the year 2010/11 there were <b>390</b> attempted burglaries in the borough and 389 in the 2009/10 year.	




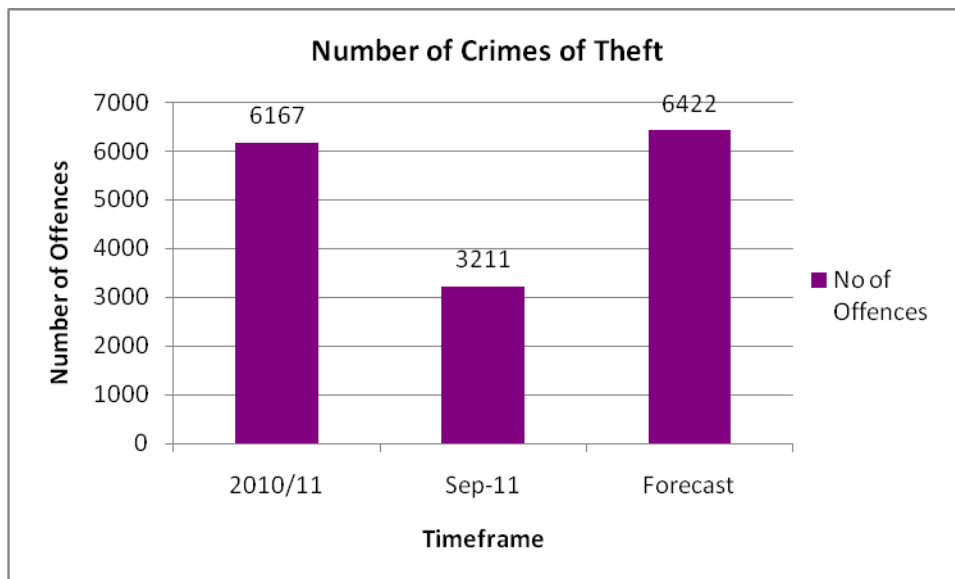
# 11. The number of distraction burglaries

<b>Definition</b>	Any crime where a falsehood, trick or distraction is used on an occupant of a dwelling to gain, or try to gain, access to premises to commit burglary. (Home Office counting rules for recording crime April 04)	
<b>Good performance</b>	Good performance would be to see a fall in the number of distraction burglaries in 2011/12 compared to the 92 in 2010/11.	
<b>Base line</b>	In the year 2010/11 there were <b>92</b> distraction burglaries in Barking and Dagenham.	




## 12. The number of crimes of theft

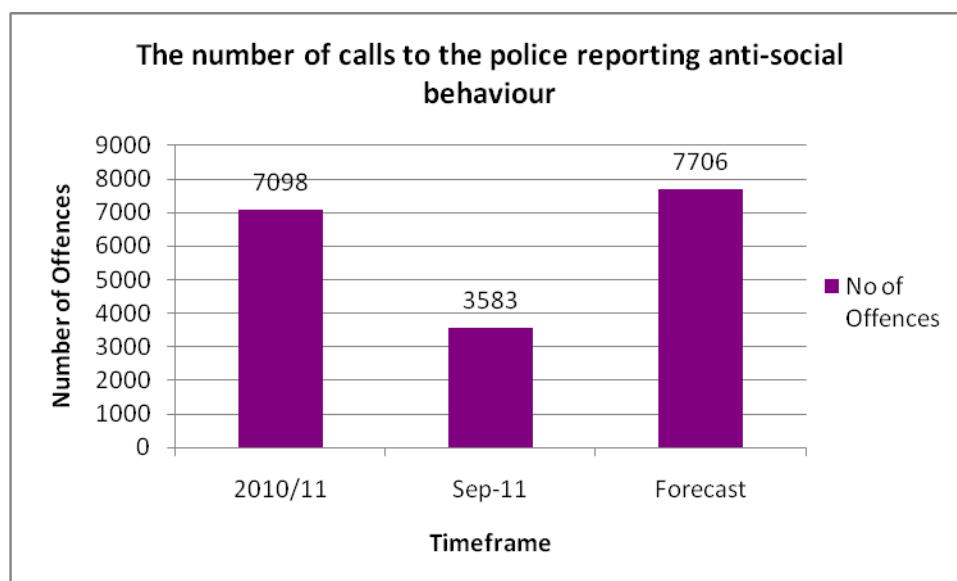
<b>Definition</b>	<p>Theft is typically defined as the taking of almost anything of value without the consent of the owner, with the intent to permanently deprive him or her of the value of the property taken. This figure is made up of motor vehicle theft and theft from motor vehicles, theft from shops, theft of pedal cycles, theft from person and other theft offences.</p>	
<b>Good performance</b>	<p>Good performance would be considered having less than the 6167 incidents of theft that we had last.</p>	
<b>Base Line</b>	<p>In the 2010/11 year in the borough there were <b>6167</b> incidents of theft.</p>

## 13. The number of calls to the police reporting anti-social behaviour

<b>Definition</b>	Anti social behaviour includes Abandoned Vehicles, Vehicle Nuisance, Rowdy/Inconsiderate Behaviour, Hoax Calls to 999, Rowdy/Nuisance Neighbours, Littering, Animal Problems, Trespass, Malicious/ Nuisance Communications, Street Drinking, Prostitution Related Behaviour, Noise, Begging/ Vagrancy and Fireworks	
<b>Good performance</b>	Good performance would be this year the police receiving less than the number of calls received in 2010 from residents of Barking and Dagenham relating to Anti Social Behaviour	
<b>Base Line</b>	During the 2010 calendar year the police received <b>7098</b> calls from residents of Barking and Dagenham relating to Anti Social Behaviour.

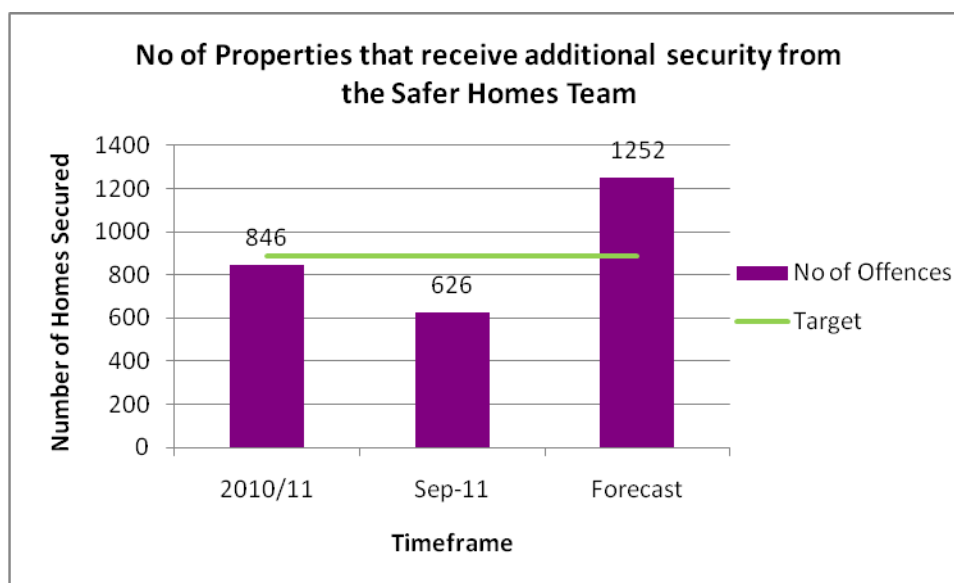
## 14. % of victims who are satisfied with the way their ASB complaint was dealt with

<b>Definition</b>	The percentage of people who have been victims of anti-social behaviour and were happy with the way in which their case was handled.	
<b>Good performance</b>	Good performance would be to get this figure to as near 100% as possible.	
<b>Base Line</b>	The Base Line Data is being set in 2011/12

## 15. Number of Properties that receive additional security from the Safer Homes Service

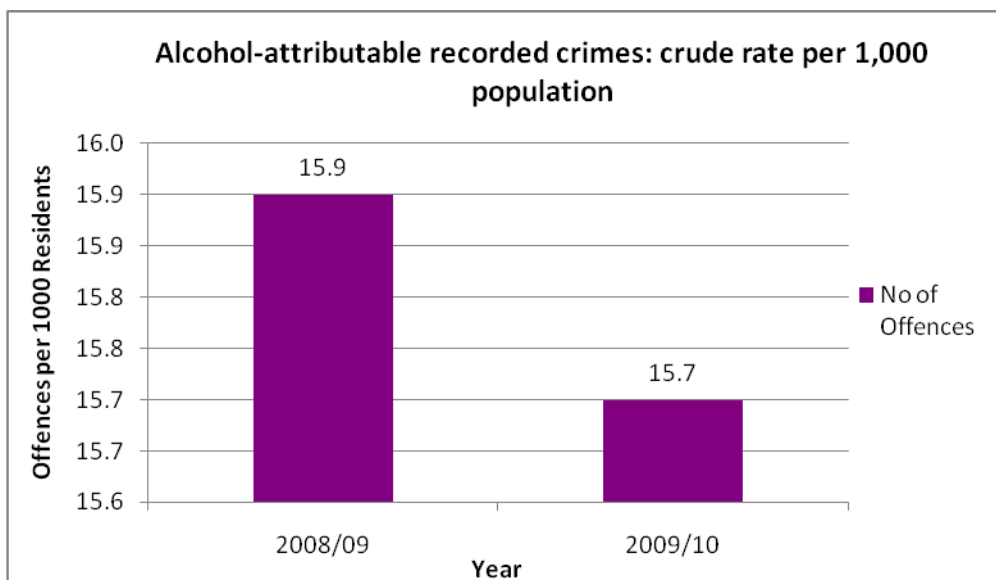
<b>Definition</b>	The number of properties in the borough which have been visited, assessed and had their security improved by the Safer Homes Service.	
<b>Good performance</b>	Good practice would be to visit and secure more homes this year than in 2010/11.	
<b>Base Line</b>	In the Year 2010/11 the Safer Homes Service visited and secured <b>846</b> homes in the borough

## 16. Alcohol-attributable recorded crimes: crude rate per 1,000 population

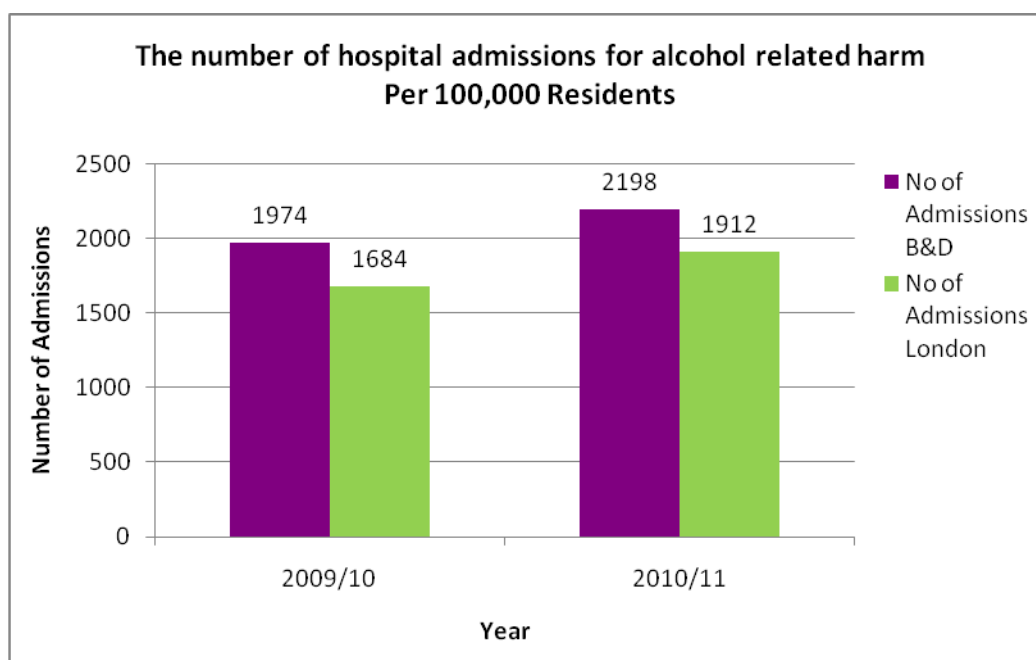
<p><b>Definition</b></p>	<p>A crude rate of alcohol recorded crimes per 1,000 population. This indicator is an aggregate of six offences - 'violence against the person', 'sexual offences', 'robbery', 'burglary dwelling', 'theft of a motor vehicle', 'theft from a vehicle'. Attributable fractions for alcohol for each crime category were applied, based on survey data on arrestees who tested positive for alcohol by the Strategy Unit.</p> <p>Data is released annually with the latest data set available for 2009/10.</p> <p>For further information please see <a href="http://www.nwph.net/alcohol/lape/downloads/Lape_guidance_and_methods.pdf">http://www.nwph.net/alcohol/lape/downloads/Lape_guidance_and_methods.pdf</a></p>	
<p><b>Good Performance</b></p>	<p>To achieve a lower rate per 1,000 population when compared to the baseline.</p>	
<p><b>Base Line</b></p>	<p>2008/09 rate per 1,000 population = 15.9 (baseline) 2009/10 rate per 1,000 population = 15.7 (latest figures available).</p>

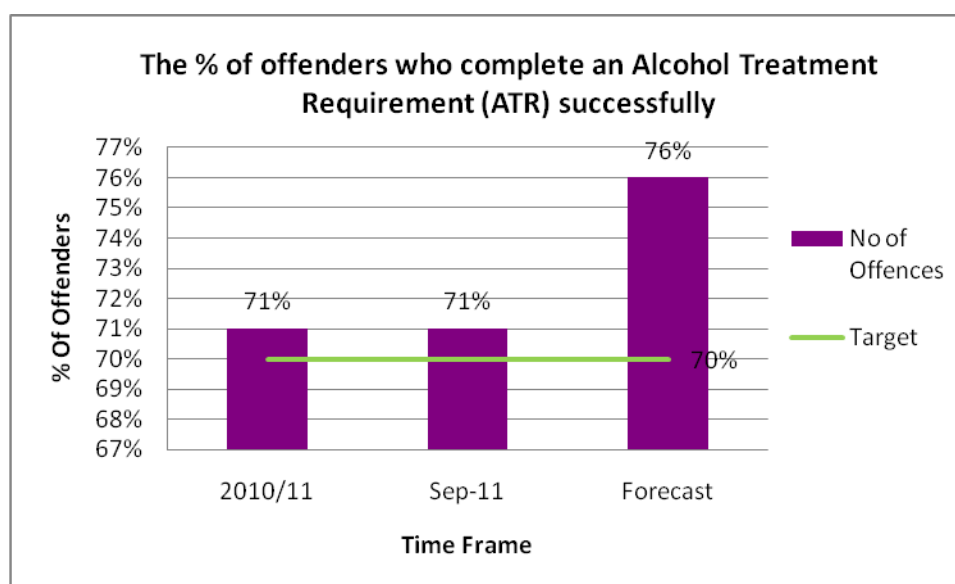
## 17. The number of hospital admissions for alcohol related harm

<b>Definition</b>	People who have attended hospital in relation to alcohol related harm and have stayed overnight and occupied a bed space.	
<b>Good Performance</b>	Good performance would be to have fewer hospital admissions than the baseline.	
<b>Base Line</b>	During 2010/11 there were <b>3,686</b> alcohol related hospital admissions in Barking and Dagenham. This is an increase of <b>407</b> individuals (11%) from 2009/10 where there were <b>3279</b> admissions.	




## 18. The % of offenders who complete an Alcohol Treatment Requirement (ATR) successfully

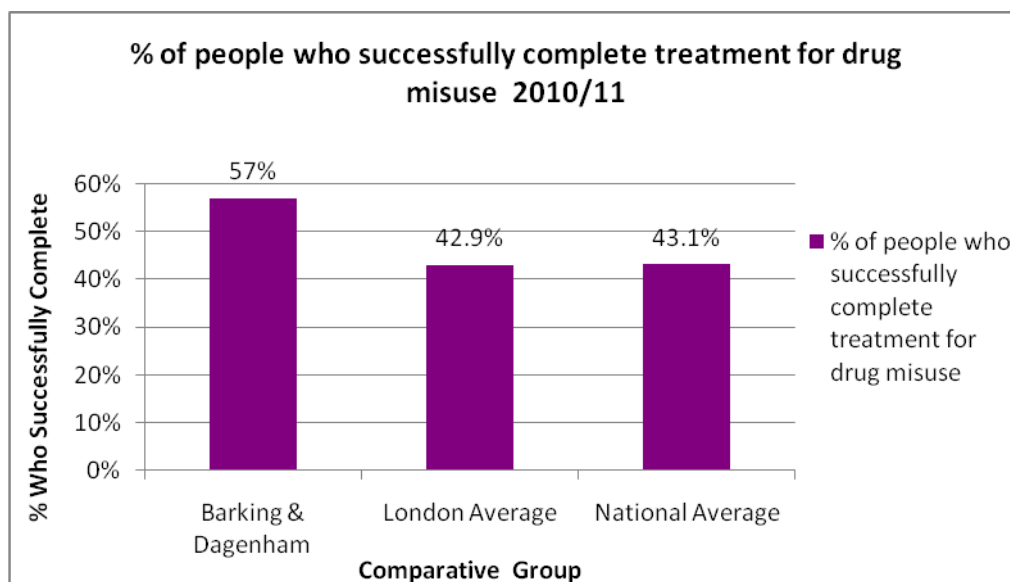
<b>Definition</b>	<p>A successful completion is one which is recorded on the Probation case management system as having expired normally (i.e. run its full course) or has been revoked early by the court for good progress. The target is across both Barking &amp; Dagenham and Havering areas.</p>	
<b>Good performance</b>	<p>Good performance is measured by achieving the set targets. 2011/12 Target: 70% must complete successfully</p>	
<b>Base Line</b>	<p>In 2010/11 Barking &amp; Dagenham and Havering had 59 individuals successfully complete their ATR from a total of 83 individuals discharged (71%).</p>

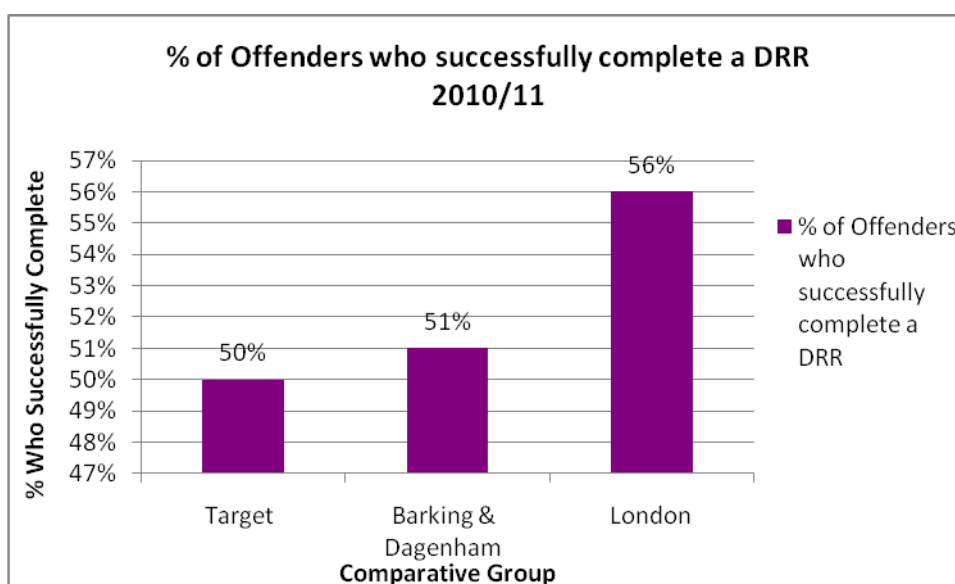
## 19. The percentage of people (over 18) who successfully complete treatment for drug misuse

<b>Definition</b>	<p>An individual's drug treatment journey is classified as a successful completion when they have been discharged from the local treatment system as either 'Treatment Completed' or 'Treatment Completed - Drug Free'. The indicator measures the proportion of individuals who successfully completed treatment out of all the clients who were discharged between April 2011 and March 2012.</p>	
<b>Good performance</b>	<p>The Barking &amp; Dagenham Drug &amp; Alcohol Action Team (DAAT) has set an ambitious target for the treatment system to achieve a successful completion rate of 65% by the end of March 2012. The achievement of this target is considered good performance.</p>	
<b>Base Line</b>	<p><u>April 2010 - March 2011</u></p> <p>Barking &amp; Dagenham: 57% (196 individuals successfully completed treatment out of 344 individuals discharged)</p> <p>London average: 42.9%</p> <p>National average: 43.1%</p>	




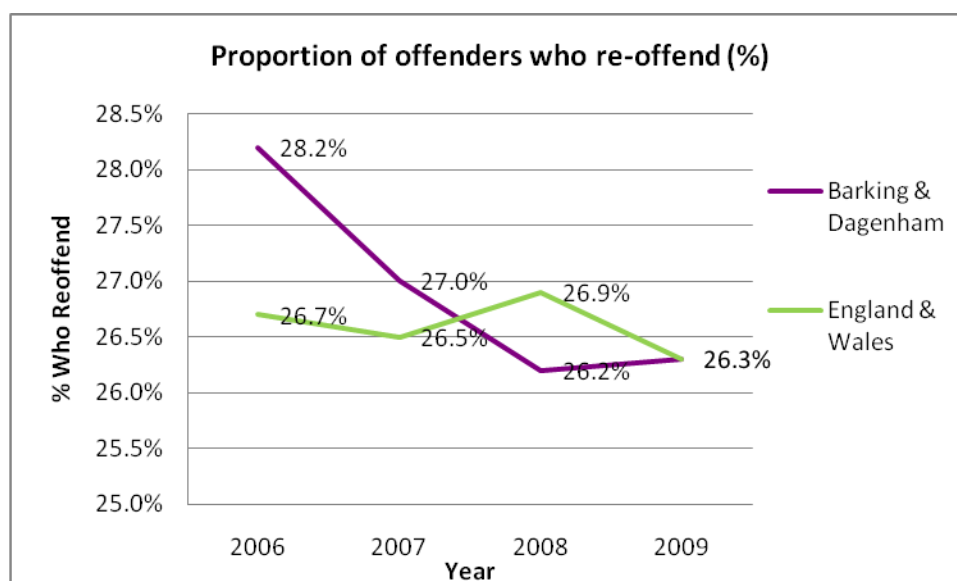
## 20. The % Of Offenders who successfully complete a DRR

<p><b>Definition</b></p>	<p>The Drug Rehabilitation Requirement (DRR) is a court order designed to reduce offenders' abuse of drugs and the crimes they commit to fund their drug abuse. A DRR combines structured drug treatment, drug testing and weekly supervision with a probation officer and can last from six months to three years.</p> <p>This indicator measures the percentage of offenders successful completing a DRR out of the total DRRs terminating between April 2011 and March 2012</p>	
<p><b>Good performance</b></p>	<p>Good performance is measured by achieving the set target. Barking &amp; Dagenham has a successful completion target of 54% for the 2011/12 period.</p>	
<p><b>Base Line</b></p>	<p>2011/12 target = 54%</p> <p>2010/11 performance = 51%, London average = 56%</p>	




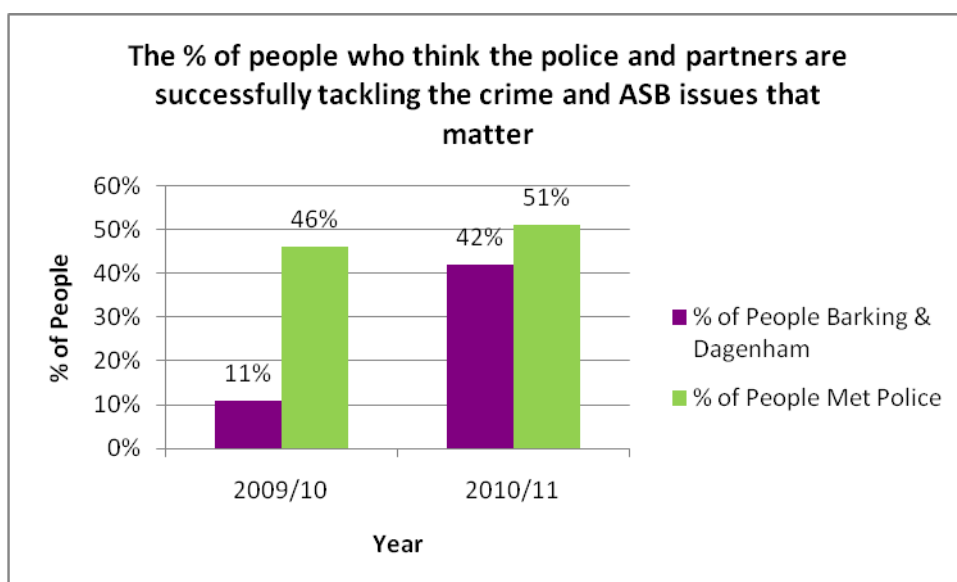
## 21. The reoffending rate of youth and adult offenders

<b>Definition</b>	Proven re-offending is defined as any offence committed in a one year follow-up period and receiving a court conviction, caution, reprimand or warning in the one year follow up. Following this one year period, a further 6 months is allowed for cases to progress through the courts.	
<b>Good Performance</b>	Lower than the 26.3% reoffending rate achieved in 2009	
<b>Base Line</b>	In 2009 the reoffending rate in Barking and Dagenham was 26.3%, this was the same as the overall rate for England and Wales.	




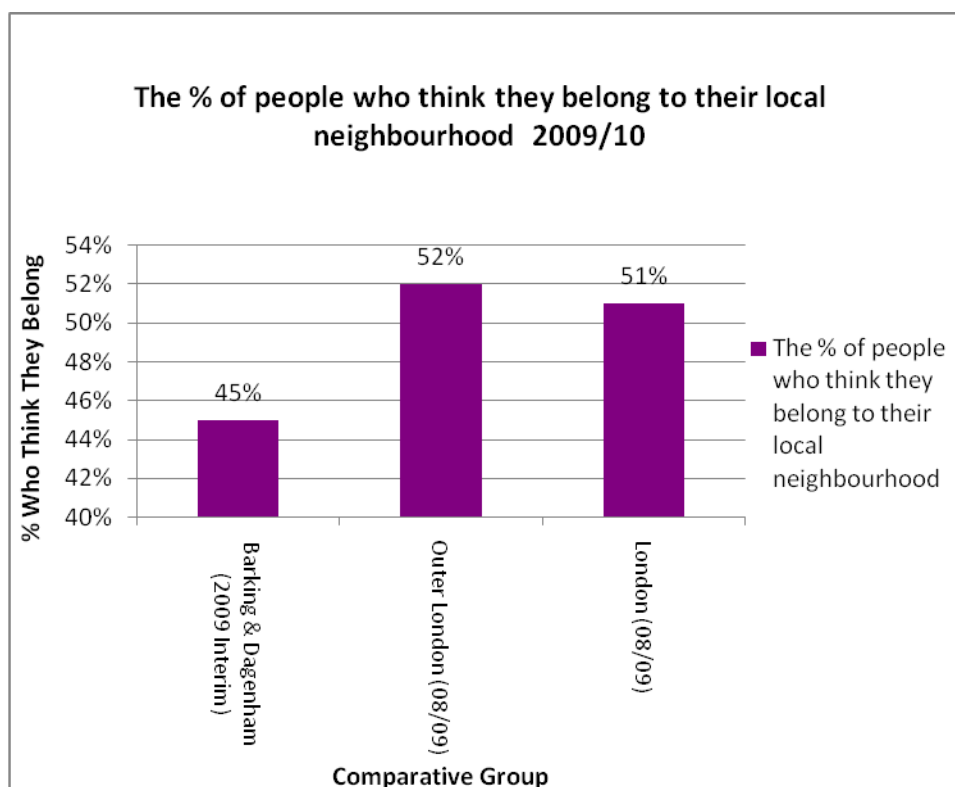
## 22. The % of people who think the police and partners are successfully tackling the crime and ASB issues that matter

<b>Definition</b>	<p>The Percentage of residents of the borough who feel that the police and other local services are successfully reducing crime and anti-social behaviour within Barking and Dagenham.</p>	
<b>Good Performance</b>	<p>This information will come from the Metropolitan Police Public Attitude Survey and good performance will be to see an increase in the percentage of residents who feel that the police and partners are being successful.</p>	
<b>Base Line</b>	<p>Results from the 2009/10 Public Attitude Survey showed that 11% of the borough felt that the police and other local services were successfully dealing with Anti Social Behaviour and Crime this is compared to the Met average of 46%, the 2010/11 survey showed this rose to 42% compared to the Met average of 41%.</p>	




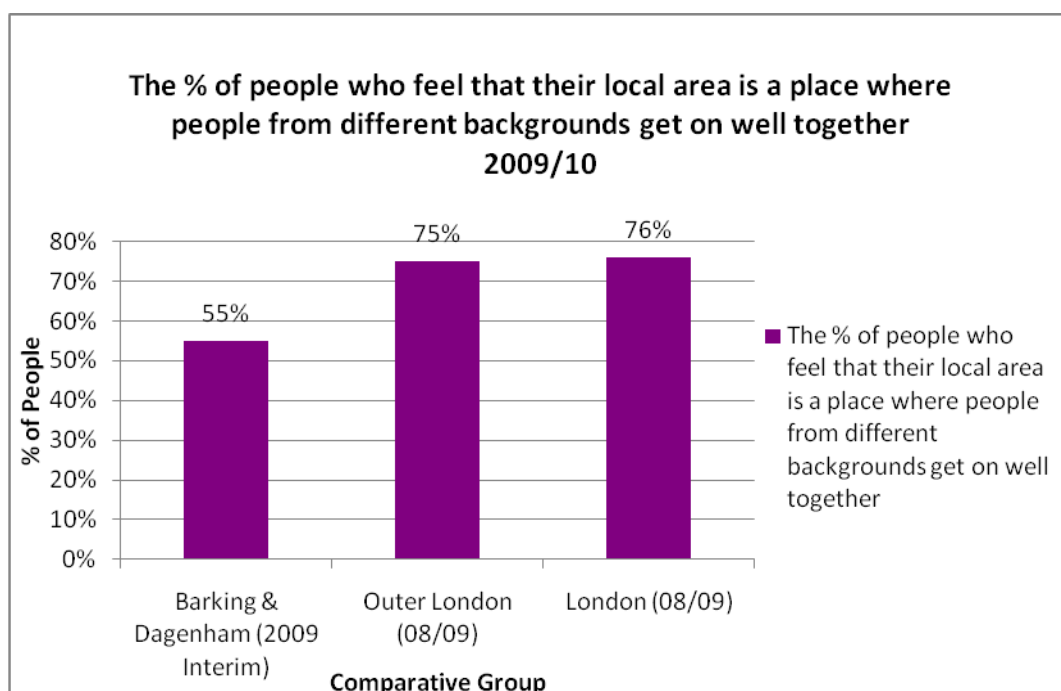
## 23. The % of people who think they belong to their local neighbourhood

<b>Definition</b>	The percentage of residents of Barking and Dagenham who feel that they belong and are a part of the borough.	
<b>Good Performance</b>	This information will be collected from the Resident's Survey and good performance will be obtaining a higher percentage of people who think they belong to their local neighbourhood.	
<b>Base Line</b>	The results from the 2009/10 place survey showed that <b>45%</b> of residents felt that they belong to their neighbourhood, this was the same in the 2008/09 survey when the result was <b>44.8%</b> .	




## 24. The % of people who feel that their local area is a place where people from different backgrounds get on well together

<b>Definition</b>	The percentage of the residents of Barking and Dagenham who feel that people from different backgrounds in the borough get on well together	
<b>Good Performance</b>	This information will be collected from the Resident's Survey and good performance will be obtaining a higher percentage than the one achieved in the 2009/10 Place Survey	
<b>Base line</b>	Results from the last Place Survey which was carried out in 2009/10 showed that <b>55%</b> of people in the borough believe that people from different backgrounds get on well together in their local area, this is a rise on 2008/09 when it was <b>49.1%</b>	



## 25. The % of people who think there is a problem with people not treating each other with respect and consideration in their local area

<b>Definition</b>	The percentage of residents of Barking and Dagenham who feel that people in the borough are not treating each other with respect and consideration.	
<b>Good Performance</b>	This information will be collected from the Resident's Survey and good performance will be obtaining a lower figure than the one from the 2009/10 Place Survey.	
<b>Base Line</b>	Results from the last Place Survey which was carried out in 2009/10 showed that <b>56%</b> of people in the borough felt that people were not treating each other with respect and consideration.
